Ronald Keith Gaddie, Ph.D.
University of Oklahoma

A presentation entitled:
“Putting the Fix on Gerrymandering”

Keith Gaddie is President’s Associates Presidential Professor and Executive Faculty Fellow of the University, and also Senior Fellow of Headington College.

His current research focuses in three areas: the intersect of the built environment and democratic values; redistricting; and voting rights reform. His primary project, undertaken with Jocelyn Evans of the University of West Florida, examines the historic homes of the U.S. Supreme Court, exploring the evolution of the court’s built space, its institutional evolution, and its changing culture as a political and social organization. He and Evans are also working on a project to bridge the various methodologies used to examine the concept of ‘democracy’ in architecture and public spaces.



Keith has authored or coauthored 24 books or volumes, and is a two-time winner of the V. O. Key Jr. Award for the outstanding book on Southern Politics. Among his published works are the books *Regulating Wetlands Protection* (2000), *Triumph of Voting Rights In the South* (2009), *Rise and Fall of the Voting Rights Act* (2016), and *The Three Governors Controversy: Skullduggery, Machinations, and the Decline of Georgia’s Progressive Politics* (2015). His textbook with Thomas R. Dye, *Politics in America*, is entering its 12th edition.

Since joining the faculty at OU in 1996, Keith has been professor of political science (College of Arts & Sciences) and since 2017 also of journalism (Gaylord College of Journalism and Mass Communication). He also serves as associate director of the OU Center for Intelligence and National Security, founded in 2014 under a grant from the Defense Intelligence Agency. Together with Dr. Kim Gaddie and Prof. Kirby Goedel of Texas A&M, Keith is coeditor of *Social Science Quarterly*, the world’s oldest, leading interdisciplinary social science journal. From 2014-2017 he served as chair of the Department of Political Science at the University of Oklahoma.

Rick Crawford grew up in a military family where his father served in the United States Air Force. During that time, Rick had the opportunity to live all over the United States and overseas.

Upon graduation from high school, Rick enlisted in the United States Army where he served as an Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technician. He completed four years of service, advanced to the rank of Sergeant in under three years, and earned numerous medals for service at home and in Southwest Asia.

After completing his military service, Rick attended Arkansas State University and graduated in 1996 with a degree in Agriculture Business and Economics.

Rick's professional career has been primarily focused on agriculture in both agri-communications and general agri-business. He has been a news anchor, agri-reporter, and served as marketing manager for one of the largest John Deere dealer groups in North America.

Rick serves on the House Agriculture Committee where he is the Subcommittee Chairman on General Farm Commodities and Risk Management and a member of the Nutrition Subcommittee. Rick is also honored to serve on the House Transportation & Infrastructure Committee where he is a member of the subcommittees on Highway and Transit, Water Resources and Environment, and Economic Development. Finally, Rick is also a member of the Permanent House Select Committee on Intelligence, where he serves on two subcommittees: the Department of Defense Intelligence and Overhead Architecture Subcommittee and the Emerging Threats Subcommittee.
